

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If we want to understand what the Dharma teaches us about building affinity and living in harmony with others, we must first understand the four great all-embracing virtues. The Buddha teaches that for us to realize our true capacity of connecting with and serving our fellow citizens, we have to first build a good rapport, and the four virtues are tools to that end. The four virtues are: giving, speaking with kind words, conducting oneself for the benefit of others, and adapting oneself to others.

Despite the fact that there are obvious and limitless benefits to practicing the first virtue of giving, many of us choose to lead our lives in a merely self-centered and self- satisfying way. We are often reluctant to put others ahead of ourselves, choosing instead to focus on our own comfort and success. Competition to be the best and have the most permeates contemporary society, making it quite challenging at times to regard the welfare of others as our primary concern. We strive to be better than others, and we often measure the quality of our life by how we compare with those around us. This worldview is the root cause of human conflict and prevents us from being generous to each other. People who are so focused on their own survival and status have no qualms about taking; however, when it is their turn to give, they make all kinds of excuses. If we deeply understand and apply the Buddha's teachings on the truth of life and the universe, we will change our ways; our natural tendency will be to give to others and not take from them. If we understand that every cause has its effect, and that we all share common causes and conditions, then we may think differently about taking advantage of others, and we will not be so hesitant about giving.
